Poverty and the lack of available local services/resources increased our awareness of basic needs such as food and health care. Providing school, home and community-based services and education increased community member's trust of 'agencies'."
Children's Trust of Roanoke Valley	The Roanoke Valley TICN trained approximately 100 community members in a basic understanding of trauma. They also strengthened partnerships and continued to grow their network with contacts in healthcare, law enforcement, and Spanish-speaking organizations.
Greater Richmond SCAN	The Greater Richmond Trauma-Informed Community Network (GRTICN) held meetings (including a few in-person meetings during quarter four), film screenings, committee meetings (for schools, courts, healthcare, outcomes, and community resilience), and served as the statewide coordinator for all Virginia TICNs. Through the VA TICN network, they hosted three annual Resilience Weeks which were recognized by the Governor of Virginia. In 2022, they hosted the Building Resilient Communities virtual conference to highlight the work of Virginia's trauma-informed community networks.
United Way of Southwest Virginia	United Way of Southwest Virginia held Southwest VA Trauma Informed Community Network Meetings, participated in regional coalition and partner meetings, hosted and participated in trainings, and started the Trauma Informed Schools Initiative.
Fairfax County Department of Neighborhood and Community Services	The Fairfax TICN delivered free trainings, consultation, and technical support to agencies in the area on resilience and trauma. They also recruited a cohort of ACE Interface trainers who provided virtual presentations.

Eastern Virginia Medical School	The Resilient & Trauma-Informed Workgroup held 18 meetings, hosted a foursession training with 45 partners, and nine individuals participated in the train-the-trainer program. Throughout the grant period, they hosted 18 presentations featuring various speakers.
Southside Survivor Response Center, Inc.	The West Piedmont Trauma and Resiliency Community Network (WPTRCN) hosted and facilitated community book-club meetings focused on nationally recognized works on trauma and resilience. Additionally, they coordinated regular meetings and trainings with WPTRCN members to provide networking and learning opportunities on a variety of issues including; trauma 101 training, racial trauma, mental health and strength-based approaches for child care workers and educators. A website was also established to share resources and information on community services and tools related to trauma informed strategies.
